### Mrs. W. J. Pretzel Discusses Birds at Club Meeting

Mrs. William J. Pretzel of Lake Zurich discussed "Birds in the Garden" at a meeting of the Barrington Bird club held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Schwemm, 113 W. Main street, Tuesday evening.

The speaker outlined the habits of three types of birds—ground birds such as the meadow lark, bob o'link and killdeer, orchard birds such as robins, vireos, wood peewees, orioles, mourning doves, blue birds and humming birds, and garden birds like the brown thrasher and cat bird. Stressing their economic value to man, she said "we must discourage all killing of birds by children." In conclusion, she discussed the migration of birds and reported that 140 species of migratory birds had been observed in Olio in one day. Later members of the club reported those seen in this community this spring.
