

Hold burial rites for Milton Kampert Saturday Afternoon

Funeral services for Milton Kampert, 45-year-old former resident of Barrington and son of Mrs. Louise Kampert, 659 Division street, were held at the chapel, 223 S. Cook street, Saturday afternoon with Rev. W. A. Stauffer officiating. Burial took place in Evergreen cemetery.

Mr. Kampert died of injuries received at Elkhorn, Wis., Wednesday. He had been working in a field with a tractor and a quick grass cutter and in some unknown manner became trapped in the grass-digging machine and was severely mutilated.

A farm hand noticed the tractor running in circles and when it continued to do so, investigated. The length of time that Mr. Kampert had been dragged by the machine is not known, but he was dead when removed by workers who had come to his aid.

Mr. Kampert was born in Cuba township December 21, 1891, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Kampert. He had spent most of his life in this community but moved to Wisconsin two years ago.

He is survived by his widow, Ruth, six children, Gerald, Dudley, Janet, Milton Jr., Ruth and

11-year-old daughter, Mrs. Louise Kampert, three brothers, S. H., Elmer, and Arthur, all of Barrington, and one sister, Mrs. Fred Otto, also of Barrington.

Town supervisors H. D. Kelsey of Cuba and Harry W. Washo of Els were appointed to several important committees for 1936-27 on the Lake county board of supervisors at a meeting in Waukegan Tuesday.

Each was appointed to head one committee and to serve on two others.

Supervisor Kelsey was made chairman of the plats and subdivision committee and was named a member of the license and purchasing committee. Supervisor Washo was appointed head of the committee of public buildings and grounds as well as a member of the purchasing and miscellaneous claims committee.

The purchasing committee is considered one of the most important of the board due to the amount of buying done each year. The license committee is also regarded as a favorable post. As chairman of public buildings and grounds, Supervisor Washo will have charge of the county court-house in Waukegan.

Thieves Rob Leech Auto Parts Company 2nd Time in Month

For the second time in four weeks, thieves broke into the Leech Auto Parts Co., 196 West Main street, Sunday or early Monday morning, and stole spark plugs, small auto tools and other accessories valued at about \$60. They also took \$5.49 in cash from the register.

The rear door was found open Monday morning. The lock was broken and a heavy bar had been pried out of place.

On Sunday, March 29, thieves entered the place and stole \$255 or \$40 worth of merchandise and a small amount of change from the cash drawer. M. G. Schram, local manager, discovered and reported the robbery.
