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School Representatives Attend Meeting Called by Supt. N. J. Puffer

Dettler attended a meeting of representatives of school boards, superintendents and principals at the Sherman hotel, Chicago, Wednesday, April 22. The conference was called by N. J. Puffer, Cook county superintendent of schools, to discuss financial conditions of county schools. The topic of the evening was "methods of increasing school revenues without raising taxes." According to those attending the meeting, the plan discussed was that of having state and federal governments contribute definite amounts annually to the support of each child's education. In many states, this type of assistance from the states has been adopted, they reported.
