

### Naperville Wins Palatine Relays; Two Records Fall

#### Notz and Stout Only Point Winners for Barrington in Poor Showing

The records were broken in the 400 yard relay at the fourth annual meet Saturday. Barrington boys school finished ninth in a 500 yard relay.

In the high jump event Ray of Naperville bested his mark made in 1924 when he jumped 5 feet 11 inches. He extended the bar by 3 1/2 inches over the old mark. The record was set by Sharp of Naperville. He jumped 5 feet 11 inches. The old record, made by Naperville in 1922, was 5 feet 7 1/2 inches.

Naperville totaled 53 1/2 points. The team was third with 24 1/2 points. Barrington finished 11th with 11 1/2 points.

### WHAT'S GOING ON IN WASHINGTON

Brushing aside republican attacks, the democratic majority in the house prepares to vote a tax bill designed to plug leaks in present revenue laws.

As reported from committee by a vote of 15 to 8, the bill provides an incentive for corporations to pay out in dividends a large proportion of their earnings. The expectation is that profits, thus distributed to stockholders, will swell individual incomes on which the surtax applies.

Chiefly through this means, an additional revenue of \$29 million dollars annually is hoped for. In the first year after enactment, the estimated returns are 493 million due to temporary continuance of present capital stock and excess profits taxes.

The total yield expected falls short of what the president has asked, the committee relying on a supplementary bill next year or a rise in revenue above estimate to make up the difference.

Attacks on the bill take two forms.

The one contained in the minority report of the house committee opposes any bill until government expenditures are cut down at least by the amount of the revenue sought.

The other form of attack gathers strength in the senate, where committee hearings open this week. It criticizes the bill as wrong in principle, through discouragement of reserve; progress in making up the difference in present income tax rates.

A crumb of comfort for those who are watching Uncle Sam's credit: the government's deficit since the beginning of the fiscal year (last July 1) becomes for the first time smaller than that of the previous year, which in turn was smaller than the deficit of the year before.

The reason: income is up 8 per cent while expenses are larger by only 3 per cent.

Size of the deficit: 2547 million dollars.

For the year as a whole, a larger deficit than the previous year is, humbly speaking, a certainty, and for two reasons.

One is the payment of the soldiers' bonus, for which bonds will begin to go out on June 15, these being callable at once if the holders so desire.

The other is the fact that the bulk of farm benefit checks are still to be mailed, representing what the president has called a

### Lake Forest and Ela High Tie for Baseball Honors

Early U. S. Mail Coaches  
On September 3, 1800, three commissioners appointed by President Jefferson to lay out the Cumberland (or National) road met at Cumberland, Md., to begin their work. It was the first federal project for the improvement of internal transportation and communication. In 1818 United States mail coaches were running over the road to Wheeling, then in Virginia. Eventually this highway was built westward through Ohio, Indiana and Illinois to St. Louis, Mo. Of it one writer says: "It carried thousands of population and millions of wealth into the West; and more than any other material structure in the land, served to harmonize, if not to save, the Union."

Mahogany  
American mahogonies have a straighter grain and more mellow texture and are found in logs of longer and wider cuttings. They are a rich, golden brown in tone. African mahogany logs are enormous, sometimes measuring from 14 to 30 feet long and from 3 to 6 feet in diameter. The wood is of a pale golden brown color and is lighter in weight, with slightly larger pores, than the other types. Also, it is more lavishly figured. Therefore, it furnishes three-fourths of all mahogany veneers.

Why and Where the Tone of Violin is Produced  
This is roughly what happens to the sound when a violinist is playing on a Strad or similar instrument:

The back of the instrument with its divergent grain is usually made of some kind of crotchets or maple, while the belly is nearly always of pine.—Tit-Bits Magazine.
