Volumes withdrawn during year—adults, 32; children, 37; total, 69. Total volumes in library—adults, 4715; children, 1578; total, 6293. Newspapers and periodicals currently received—adults, 24; children, 21; total, 45.

Registration: Borrowers registered during year—adults, 108; children, 18; total, 126. Total number of borrowers, 1576.
