**Overseer Voliva Lists
Greater Liabilities in
Involuntary Bankruptcy**

With many hundreds of parcels of land and other properties of Wilbur Glenn Voliva listed, one of the largest and most voluminous schedules ever filed in a bankruptcy case was entered Friday in the United States district court in Chicago on Voliva's personal involuntary bankruptcy case instituted in May, 1933.

The schedule filed lists liabilities of \$1,700,000 and assets approximating \$1,200,000, including some 6000 separate items, half of which are real estate leaseholds in Voliva's name.

A petition for a composition was submitted by Voliva with the schedule, offering to place in trust with the First National Bank of Zion all of the property involved, provided Voliva and two others, preferably City Judge Theodore Forby and Vernon Carroll of the Chicago Title and Trust company, are appointed as trustees.
