"TO BUY VOTES"

The first deficiency bill which had been scheduled for a vote in the house Monday of this week calls for more than one million dollars of appropriation to oil the wheels of re-election for the party in power.

Commenting on the manner in which it was to be steam-rolled through congress, Ralph Church, representative from the Illinois tenth district, declared on the floor of the house: "This bill and copies of the hearings just became available at noon yesterday. As stated by the gentleman from Virginia, acting chairman of the committee in charge of the bill, we are expected to read, within 24 hours, more than 2,000 pages of testimony which includes the 100 pages of this bill. It is characteristic of this administration to give us the bill almost on the day that debate upon it opens. The opposition is never allowed to prepare appropriate amendments. Even a cursory glance, however, shows this bill to be the last struggle of the 'hypocrites' for the relief vote on the eve of election."

WHAT'S GOING ON IN WASHINGTON

New tax proposals as a menace to business form the dominant theme of witnesses before the senate committee, which is considering a revenue measure passed by the house.

Among the forms which the menace is declared to take are these, as set forth by leading business associations: 1. A hindrance to reemployment and social security through substituting public control for private management. 2. Peril to solvency by creating difficulties in the payment of debts and in the raising of new money. 3. Hardship to industries which fluctuate markedly, such as the making of machine tools, since the retention of earnings as reserves is penalized.

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protests against mounting military expenditures. Replies Senator Nye: "I have been unable to find any traces of such protests."

Meanwhile the president indicates his intention of sending to the senate a three-power treaty negotiated at London with Great Britain and France. It limits the size of armaments on the largest ships and the tonnage of individual ships in certain classifications.

To the white house for the president's signature goes the army appropriation bill, calling for an outlay next year of \$72 million dollars, which, like the navy bill, sets a peace-time record.

To protect the public from deceptive statements and practices by sellers, the senate votes for enlarging the powers of the federal trade commission.

At the same time, it would increase the commission's powers of enforcement. Now when a case and default order is issued, it cannot be enforced until it has been violated and a conviction secured in the courts.

Under the law in prospect, the order would be enforceable when first issued, provided the circuit court of appeals agreed with the commission's findings of law and of fact.

New Trier High School Wins Event Over Large Field

Glenn Hager Will Accompany Stout to Champaign Thursday

L. Stout, star Broncho track performer, qualified for the state finals by taking second place in the pole vault at the district meet in Evanston Saturday. Stout will leave Barrington Thursday to compete for state honors in Champaign Saturday. Accompanying him will be Glenn Hager who will play in final rounds for the state golf championship. Hager will play 36 holes in medal competition on Friday afternoon and Sunday morning. Coach Paul Clark will go to Champaign with the boys.

Stout was the only qualifier from the local track team and also scored the only points. New Trier high school finished first in the total column with 54 points and narrowly lost out to Evanston which came second with 51 1/2 points. Barrington finished in eighth place with 3 1/2 points. Eleven schools but squads representing them. More than 300 thirty-grade were entered in the events.
