

Mrs. A. Walschlager Dies; Funeral Held at Dundee Friday

Funeral services for Mrs. Amelia Walschlager, former resident of Barrington township, were held at the Ruhl funeral home in Dundee Friday afternoon and burial took place at Barrington Central cemetery. Rev. Charles R. Drusael of the Baptist church officiated.

Miss Blank was born in Germany December 21, 1849 and died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Anna Yager of Chicago, May 19, 1936, at the age of 86 years.

She was married to Daniel Walschlager. They established their home in Chicago and were the parents of nine children, only four of whom survive.

In 1903, the family moved to a farm in Barrington township. It was in this home that Mr. Walschlager died in 1910.

Mrs. Walschlager continued to live on the farm with a son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. George Walschlager.

The officers of the Woman's club met at the home of their new president, Mrs. August Schwerman, of Elgin, on Friday.

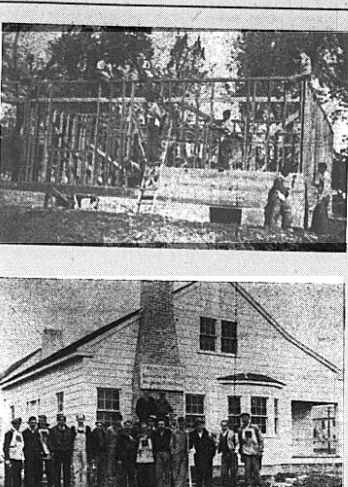

Washington Has a Rock Named for Gen. Braddock Like Plymouth, Washington has a rock, a rock which for years lay buried under the surface on the site of the Naval hospital, says the Washington Star.

The rock, known as Braddock Rock, was the landing place of General Braddock, for in those days the Potomac river flooded deeply over that section of the Capital.

Braddock, seeking a place to camp for the night, set foot on the rock in reaching shore, and the name of the rock, as a natural consequence, followed.

Braddock's camp, his first on his trip to the Ohio, gave the section now occupied by the unused portion of the Naval hospital the name of Camp Hill.

The Chesapeake & Ohio canal entered the Potomac near the general's landing place. The dirt dug from the canal was piled over his camp and, consequently, over Braddock's Rock.

Back in the early days of the American participation in the World war, existence of the rock was discovered by a historical society and a search was started for the rock. Subsequently, it was found 8 feet beneath the surface, in the open court of H building at the hospital. A brick wall and an iron railing surrounded the historic spot where the British general landed.
