Local Athletes Score in Junior Olympics Saturday

Stout, Hager and Sheesley Compete in Track Meet Saturday

Stout, Hager and Sheesley were members of the Lake county team representing Waukegan parks in the Junior Olympics track and field meet held at Rockford Saturday. The Rockford squad won first place with 49 points and beat out Waukegan by 4 1/2 points.

Stout led the local unit by scoring a win in the broad jump. He went the best distance he has made all season, leaping 21 feet, 13.4 inches. Stout also took honors in the pole vault when he tied for fourth place at 11 feet, 1 inch.

Hager placed fourth in the discus throw and Sheesley was fourth in the 220 yard low hurdles but failed to place in his specialty, the high hurdles.

Stout also ran on the 440 yard relay team that took first place. He ran in the 889 yard relay but the team was disqualified while leading the Rockford team.

The meet was sponsored by the WPA recreation department and the money collected from the meet will be used to help finance the American Olympic team on its trip to Berlin this summer.

DO YOU KNOW ILLINOIS?

The secretary of state of Illinois is the state librarian re-officio. The state library and archives division under his jurisdiction contains much information concerning your state. Any questions which are of particular interest to readers and which are not covered in this section will be answered immediately. Address all communications: Edward J. Hughes, Secretary of State, Public Information Department, Capitol, Springfield, Illinois.

Q. When was the whittoping of convicts abolished in Illinois?
A. The whittoping law was amended June 28, 1832. The convicts are now punished by solitary confinement in a dark cell and by deprivation of food, except bread and water, until such convict shall be reduced to submission and obedience.

Q. From what quarries was the stone of the present state capitol in Springfield taken?
A. The granular magnesian limestone from the Sonora quarries of Hancock county. The Niagara limestone from Joliet and Lemont, Ill.

Q. After whom was Hamilton county named?
A. After Alexander Hamilton, a soldier, statesman, author and financial aid on the staff of Washington during the revolution, a member and commander-in-chief of the United States army in 1799, and first secretary of the treasury.

Q. What is the legislative reference bureau of Illinois?
A. The legislative reference bureau which was established for the purpose of collecting summaries of current legislation in other states, collects, classifies and summarizes all bills introduced in each branch of the legislature and assists members in the preparation of bills to be introduced. The governor is the chairman.

Q. From what nation does the town of Onida take its name?
A. The name Onida comes from the Ingonia nation and means "granite people."

Q. What are the functions of the Illinois Courts of Chancery?
A. The Courts of Chancery are

courts of equity which have jurisdiction in cases where the law provides no remedy. One of the actions of equity is "where there is a wrong there is a remedy," and it is the duty of the chancery to find the remedy.

Q. What is Springfield's latest memorial to Lincoln?
A. Springfield has set aside 60 acres along the shores of Lake Springfield to be planted in shrub, trees and flowers as a garden to honor Lincoln.
