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13 Lake Zurich Boys Represent School at Meet

F. F. A. Chapter Members
Ela High School Visit
Champaign

Thirteen members of the Futwa Farmers of America of Ela township High school, Lake Zurich, competed in a state judging contest at the state convention of the F.F.A. at Urbana from Thursday to Saturday inclusive. The group from Lake Zurich placed 11th in competition with 287 schools in the state. More than 2900 boys participated.

Three points were given to the 13 schools. The Ela group won three points behind the tenth place winners, having 2595 points. Judging was done in rings of material made up of livestock and grain belonging to the University of Illinois.

The personnel of the Lake Zurich group is as follows: Ed Jones, J. Weber, M. Carlson, an Elmer Grever; corn judges, V. Miller and H. Heitsch; day judges, M. Kane, W. Nehmer, J. Earl Grever; grain judges, H. A. Larson and L. Carlson; poultry judges, L. Gleason and B. Weber. L. Carlson, president of the F.F.A. chapter, acted as delegate to the F.F.A. convention and H. Heitsch was alternate. Ray Wilkins competed in a swimming meet and placed fifth in the 50 yard swim.

James Weber made a perfect score in judging swine on the first day, as did Harvey Anderson of wheat and L. Carlson on soybeans. Willis Miller tied for eighth place in all-around judging of corn. As a result of ties it was necessary for the boys to judge again Saturday morning, several boys in each division having perfect scores. Additional ties in the Saturday's judging required the contestants to give reasons for their placing.

Results of the second day judging were as follows: James Weber, fifth in swine; Harvey Anderson, fifth in wheat; L. Carlson sixth in soybeans; Willis Miller ninth in corn. In the judging Friday, Miller made a perfect score on five of eight rings judged. Winning totals in the livestock and poultry divisions will represent a state at the national contest at Kansas City, Mo., next fall.
