Was it worth the risk?

Many of these deaths happened because drivers took chances and drove too fast for conditions, as illustrated above. That speed is a very serious factor in deaths on highways than on city streets is indicated by the fact that at city street intersections, last year deaths from about 300,000 accidents numbered only 6,000, less than half the fatalities from accidents on highways. This information strikes a warning about the danger of driving too fast, no matter how good a driver a person regards himself.

Q. What was the amount collected in "Champaign county for motor vehicle license fees last year?"

A. \$211,208.

Q. When did the legislature enact the "high license law" and what were its provisions?

A. It was enacted in 1932 and provided a minimum license of \$500 per annum for the sale of alcoholic drinks and \$150 for malt liquors, with the authority on the part of the municipalities to impose a still higher rate by ordinance.

Q. Who made the first permanent settlement in Jo Daviess county?

A. The first permanent settlement was made by Francis Houthier in the summer of 1819.

Q. What nickname Abraham Lincoln "Father Abraham"?

A. The sobriquet "Father Abraham" was popularized by James H. Thornwell in his war song, "We Are Coming, Father Abraham, Three Hundred Thousand Men."

Q. When did county organization begin in Illinois?

A. County organization in Illinois dates back to 1779 when, after the conquest of Kaskaskia and Vincennes by George Rogers Clark in 1778, the "County of Illinois" was established by legislative enactment of Virginia and the new territory, vaguely defined as to boundaries, was attached to that commonwealth. This was passed in Oct. 1778, and proclamation of the act made June 17, 1779.

Q. When was the first post office opened in Jo Daviess county?

A. The first post office was opened in 1827 at Galena. Ezekiel Lockwood was appointed first postmaster.
