### Bears Suffer First Loss By Fielding Misplays at Des Plaines

The Bears made four hits during the entire game, Reuse getting a triple in the first and George a double in the third. Williams connected with a single in the fourth and Reuse furnished the last single in the seventh.

Reuse, a new recruit, was doing the receiving for Barrington and was credited with several errors but those were not his fault. He is related to the manager for the Bears for the season.

The Plaines did all the hitting in the first four innings. In the first and second innings singles were made by Martinek, Pierce and Simon. Pierce and Simon were connected in the fourth. Witt and Reuse finished the day's hitting activities with singles in the fifth and sixth.



## Christian Science Church Appeals for World-Wide Peace

An appeal to Christian Scientists to work for the demonstration of world peace, the reading of reports by church officers on the various activities of the movement throughout the world and sustained demand for the writings of Mary Baker Eddy, discoverer and founder of Christian Science, marked the annual meeting today of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass.

Election of Mrs. Elizabeth Cadwell Tomlinson of Boston as president of The Mother Church was announced. She succeeds Dr. Frank C. Colby. Mrs. Tomlinson was born in Byfield, Mass., a graduate from St. Helen's Hall, a well-known Episcopal private school, she received a remarkable hearing in Christian Science which brought her into the practice of this religion. She was at one time a delegate appointed by the governors of Oregon to a conference of women's organizations in Paris, 1914, she was in London, England, at the outbreak of the World war and did service under Mrs. Herbert Hoover in relief activities.

Approximately 6000 Christian Scientists representing every state in the union and practically every civilized nation in the world attended the meeting.

Introducing the theme of world peace, William P. McKenzie, for the past year chairman of the board of directors, told the audience, "There is a rising demand in the hearts of men for freedom and justice. Can it be met by fair dealing? This requires self-government, does it not? Instead of battling with others to set them right, let a man become right himself and influence his neighbor by his good example.

As retiring president, Dr. Frank C. Colby declared it "encouraging to find that Christian Scientists are realizing more fully and more keenly that Christian Science is something more than a glorified theology; that it is a demonstrable science; the science of being; the science of true Christianity, that it is theology as well as a science. It is man's business to be absolutely obedient to divine Principle. God, to express, or exemplify, the nature of God. Thus he is both religious and scientific."

Also re-elected was Ezra W. Palmer, clerk of the church.

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
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## Death At Night

During the normal hours of daylight last year, from 6 a. m. to 8 p. m., according to statistics of the Farmers Insurance Company, there were 14,620 persons killed in automobile accidents, while in the normal hours of darkness, from 8 p. m. to 6 a. m., there were 21,480 deaths. This record raises the question, "Shouldn't drivers and pedestrians be afraid of the dark?"

The exceedingly high rate of death per accident for the normal hours of darkness puts the spotlight on the conditions and conduct of drivers and pedestrians responsible for such a record of fatalities after sun down. At night drivers can't easily avoid what they can't see. This is something that pedestrians need to remember.

The neck, breast, and underparts are yellow white, streaked with brown and blackish brown. The back is light grayish brown.

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
