Mrs. Harry Balme and children left for their home in Detroit Thursday, having been visiting her parents since July 4.

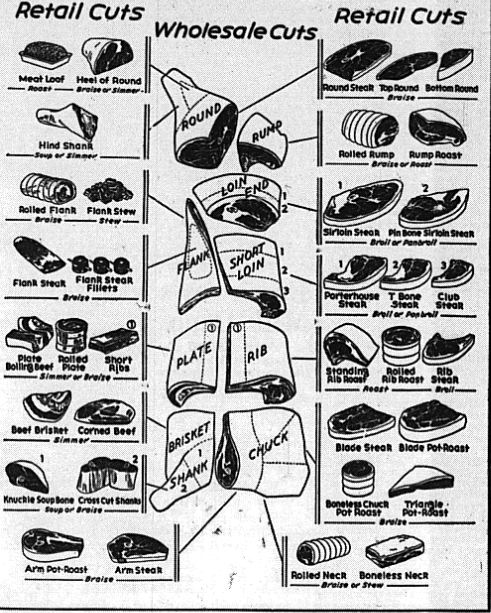
