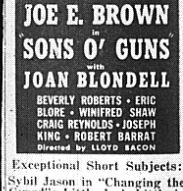

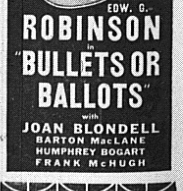

P.-T.A. Round-Up of First Graders Tuesday, Aug. 4

Clinic for Free Examination at School Gymnasium 9:30 to 12 a. m.

The medical examination of all first children eligible to enter first grade in fall is being provided by the Barrington Parent-Teacher association and will take place in the school auditorium from 9:30 to 12 a. m. Tuesday, August 4. A local doctor and a public health nurse will be in charge. Entry blanks were distributed to homes during the past two weeks by a committee consisting of James Haffner, general chairman of the round-up. The committee included Mrs. C. C. Williams, Mrs. J. M. Friedlander, Mrs. E. J. Harris, Mrs. A. L. Peterson and Mrs. Albert Wilkins. Twenty blanks were given out in addition so that persons preferring to have their own physician make the examination might do so without handicaps. The examination will be held at the school.

It is advisable to enter every child's name prior to entering school so that any physical defects may be adjusted within the next few weeks and he can start school without handicaps," Mrs. Haffner stated.

1936 Valuations of Townships Are Slightly Raised

Cuba Books to Be Completed Soon; Increases Are General in County

Property valuations in 10 out of 12 Lake county townships for which assessors' books have been turned into the 1936 board of review are slightly higher, than the equalized values fixed by the 1935 board of review. Valuations are lower in two of the townships.

The 1936 board of review, composed of John D. Thomas, Charles J. Wright and John E. Hayes Sr., now has on hand 23 of the 52 assessors' books in the county. While most of the valuations for the rural towns are being studied by the board, north shore towns assessors with the bulk of Lake county property are still working on their assessments.

On file with the board of review at present are 213 objections by property owners. The majority come from Waukegan and the lake shore towns. Property owners in the towns for which the assessors' books are now on file have up to August 1 on which to make objections.

Insects Migrate

Thos. Brock barber shop was in a building south of Dan Lamer's and the village band stand was on the south of Thos. Brock. Edward Peters was proprietor of a livery stable which covered the site where now is located the Peoples' market and Polman's Pharmacy. Mr. Peck established his livery stable in a frame building located on part of the lot now occupied by the S. Lipefsky store.

Among the veteran businessmen of 30 years or more service here are H. D. A. Grebe, Henry Schroeder, Charles Thies, Matt Peck, Emil Schaefer, W. M. Landwer and Theodore Schutt. Sam Lipofsky was a local merchant in the late nineties but moved to Elgin and later to Chicago.

Washington, in his farewell address, published September 17, 1796, said: "Why forego the advantages of so peculiar a situation? Why quit our own to stand upon foreign ground? Why, by interwoven our destiny with that of any part of Europe, entangle our peace and prosperity in the toils of European ambition, rivalry, interest, humor, or caprice? It was Jefferson who said, "Peace, commerce and honest friendship with all nations—entangling alliances with none." This was in his first inaugural address, March 4, 1801.
