

"The King Steps Out" Billed for Sunday, Monday

"Bullets or Balloons" Closes Friday; Varied List Scheduled

The leading role in "Bullets or Balloons," now being shown at the local theatre, affords Edw. G. Robinson all the opportunities for characterization which his former success as "Little Caesar" gave him. In this story he plays the part of a hard-boiled detective who pits his skill against the brains behind the racketeers.
