Miss Graham won the women's golf match at Barrington Hills Sunday.

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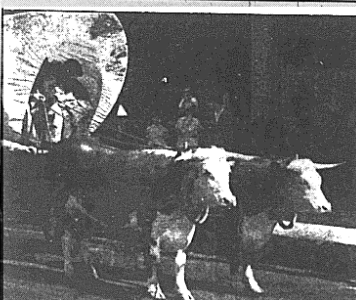
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Reviving Old Scenes

Miss Margaret Probo of Chicago is spending the summer in the Grove.

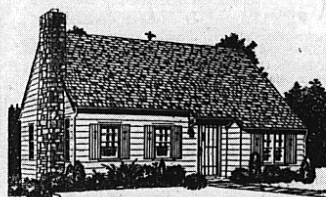
