Amelia West, a slim spinster, was the same old story. I wrote a lot of time and a lot of space which my father kindly provided.

"These were the last of my school days. Soon after I became a printer's devil in the office of the South Bend Register, a newspaper founded by former Vice President Schuyler Colfax. I acquired some knowledge of the printing craft and went on the 'road,' working from New York City to the Pacific coast, occasionally passing 'teach' a country school. He 'cases' on the old Chicago News in 1872-1873.

"I am now 32 years old and have described these reminiscences for my own amusement. I sit in comfort a few steps from the pond in the surf. Flowers bloom everywhere and the cheerful chatter of mocking birds is heard in the trees top.

"The sun shines bright on my California home.

"The birds make music all day" (apology to Mabel F. Lee).

Laying Foundation for New School on Syndicate Grounds

Will Complete Country Day School in Three Months

Excavation work has been finished and pouring of concrete started for the foundation of the new Barrington Country day school which is in course of construction on the Barrington Syndicate acres just west of the village limits and south of Lake-Cook county line.

All foundations will be in this week and the wall structure will go up next week, according to Bill Hillings, general contractor in charge.

According to plans, the new school building will be completed, ready for occupancy in three months. It will be a frame structure on poured concrete foundation.

It is located on a gently rolling prairie which will be landscaped and planted with trees and shrubs. The land is part of the Zander farms which are being sold for country estates. The slope of the land at the school house is sufficient to permit the basement to open at the east on ground level and the main floor to be just above the ground at the west. The main floor will contain classrooms and office, and the basement will have a playground, boiler room, kitchen, washroom, etc.

Lake County Chorus Will Sing at Fair

Lake county has thirty-five representatives putting on finishing touches for their part in the Illinois state fair chorus presentation at the annual "The Harvest" at Springfield, Friday evening, August 21, at 7 o'clock, according to Miss Florence Kimmelshue, home adviser.

Mrs. Charles Stults of Barrington is the director of the Lake county chorus and will conduct the presentation at Springfield. The chorus was entertained at a picnic at the home of Mrs. Robert Gillespie at Diamond Lake Monday.

The Lake county singers and musicians will combine with groups from 15 other counties to form the largest rural chorus and orchestra ever heard in Illinois. They will be in costume and each member will sing the same song as in the local county production.

"Originally scheduled for noon Friday, the event was postponed to 7 in the evening to permit more people to enjoy the spectacle," Miss Kimmelshue said.

The harvest festival is being sponsored by the extension service of the college of agriculture, Uni-versity of Illinois, as part of a definite state-wide project to assist rural people in developing their own talents, entertainment and recreation.
