Laying Foundation for New School on Syndicate Grounds

Will Complete Country Day School in Three Months

Foundation work has been finished and pouring of concrete started for the foundation of the new country day school on the syndicate grounds. The site of the school is bounded by the village limits and the country day school line. The school will be in this building and the wall structure will be completed according to Carl H. Johnson, general contractor in charge.

According to plans, the new school building will be completed, ready for occupancy in three months. It will be a frame structure on poured concrete foundation.

The school on a gently rolling plain which will be landscaped and planted with trees and shrubs. The school is part of the Zander farms which are being sold for country day school. The site of the school house is sufficient to permit the basement to be raised to the ground level and the rest of the building to be raised at the west. The building will contain classrooms and a gymnasium, boiler room, kitchen, bathroom, etc.

The Lake county singers and musicians will combine with groups from 13 other counties to form the largest rural chorus and orchestra ever heard in Illinois. They will sing the same score as in the county production.

Originally scheduled for noon Friday the concert was postponed to 7 in the evening to permit more people to enjoy the spectacle.

Mrs. Kimmelshe said, "The harvest festival is being sponsored by the extension service of the college of agriculture, University of Illinois, as part of a state-wide project to assist rural people in developing their talents, entertainment and recreation."

West, a slim spinner. It was the same old story. I wanted a lot of time and a lot of money when my father kindly provided.

These were the last of my childhood days. Soon after I became a lawyer's devil in the office of the South Bond Register, a paper founded by former Vice President Richard Coffey. I acquired some knowledge of the printing craft and went on the "road" working from New York City to the Pacific coast, occasionally passing through a country school. Held papers on the old Chicago News in 1873-1874.

I am now 82 years old and have published three reminiscences for my own amusement. I sit in comfort a few steps from the ponding water. Flowers bloom everywhere and the cheerful chatter of mockingbirds is heard in the tree tops. The sun shines bright on my California home.

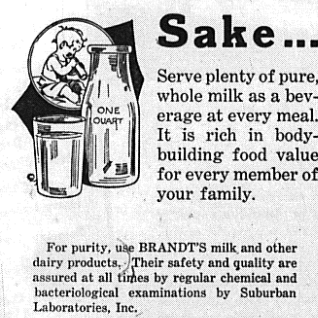
Mother of E. Gross, Is Buried Monday

Lake County Third in Gas Tax Refund

Lake county received a total net allotment of \$11,501 as its share of the motor fuel tax receipts of the month of July. It was announced by the state department of finance at Springfield Friday.

Total net allotment for all counties in the state was \$721,562 with Lake county ranking third in the amount allocated. Cook and Kane counties received greater allotments than Lake county, after the gas tax funds were held back for the \$20,000,000 and \$30,000,000 emergency relief bonds.

The secretary of state of Illinois in the state librarian ex-officio. The state library and archives division under his jurisdiction contains much information concerning your state. Q. When did Lincoln make his farewell address to the people of Springfield, Ill.
A. Feb. 11, 1861. This address was very short—less than 150 words—full of pathos and affection for the people he was leaving. "To this place and the kindness of these people," Lincoln claimed to owe everything.

Q. How were the funds raised for the Illinois legislature to drain the "American Bottom"?
A. The act of the legislature passed in 1819 at Kaskaskia authorized a lottery to raise funds for the purpose of draining the lakes and ponds in southern Illinois. Prizes amounting to \$5000 were given.

Q. What were the taxes levied by the First Territorial legislature?
A. The first legislature in Illinois (Territorial) levied taxes on real estate of \$1 on each 100 acres of land on the bottoms along the rivers and 75c on each 100 acres on the uplands for the support of the Territorial government. The county expenses were paid for out of personal taxes. Each owner of \$200 worth of personal property had to pay \$1 poll tax and certain occupations and callings were licensed.

Q. What are the penalties for reckless driving in Illinois?
A. Any person convicted of reckless driving shall be punished upon a first conviction by imprisonment for a period of not less than 60 days nor more than 90 days, or by a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Q. Who issued the first Habeas Corpus suspension order?
A. From Ferdinand Walther on November 29, 1831.
