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Former Resident's Son Gives Life to Save Companion

Rites for E. Peck Held at Evergreen Cemetery Sunday

Funeral services were held at Evergreen cemetery Sunday afternoon for Edward M. Peck, 23-year-old Elgin youth who lost his life in saving that of a girl companion, Miss Frieda Moritz, when a sail boat capsized on Lake Michigan a week ago.

Seeing that Miss Moritz was having difficulty in getting back to the overturned boat, Peck went to her rescue. He was so exhausted by his efforts, however, that he sank from sight a few moments later when he was carried away from the hull by a large wave.

His body was recovered at noon Friday by coast guardsmen who had patrolled the area since the accident.

Peck was born in Denver, Colo., but was a resident of Elgin for nine years, graduating from Elgin high school in the class of 1933. He had been attending the Milwaukee school of Engineering for the past two years.

Following services at Elgin and at Evergreen cemetery, Barrington, he was buried beside his mother, Mrs. Ira Peck, a former teacher who preceded him in death last Labor Day. His father survives him.

Will Confer With State Department on Parking Plans

The method of parking on Main street has not been settled, but village trustees are expected to adopt a final and definite plan following a conference to be held with K. Hager, chief of the engineering division of the state highway department in this district.

A resolution calling for a change in diagonal parking was presented by the chairman of the police committee, Trustee John Deschler, at the meeting Monday night. It would permit angle parking of 35 degrees.

In a discussion that followed it was brought out that the state might ban parking on Main street entirely as has been done in other communities when the state statute prohibiting parking was not observed.

A conference plan was then suggested and adopted. The meeting will be held at the earliest date convenient to all parties.

C. A. Blumer, cashier of the First National bank, appeared before the board and questioned the advisability of placing "no parking" signs on standards in the sidewalk walks as had been done in front of the bank on Cook street.

The sign, warning against parking, had been placed on a certain point and the corner, was installed by order of the village board Saturday morning. Mr. Blumer opposed it as being unsightly and falling to serve the purpose. He favored signs painted on the street.

Mr. Blumer also objected to a sign being placed on property before a discussion of the matter with property owners had been held.

The village board told Mr. Blumer that the only legal method of controlling parking in a city is by signs on standards and not by signs painted on streets, the latter to be put up only in an effort to keep cross walks clear of parked cars and to remove "blind spots" at intersections.

Village trustees expressed themselves satisfied that the method followed was the only legal and satisfactory way and declined to remove the sign.

Detectives Spot Old Bald Headed Tires

The form of detecting work that results in the saving of life rather than terminating in a court room scene was described here today by J. S. Gieske, local Good Year dealer.

Every man on the Good Year staff considers himself a "tire detective," Mr. Gieske explained. Their quarry is the worn-out, "bald-headed" tire that may threaten a sudden blowout for some hapless motorist.

"The idea originated last year, when Goodyear retained Commissioner Joseph Faurot, famous detective, to do some special work," he explains. "Faurot evolved the famous tread-print method by which a tire betrays its stopping power, or lack of it as clearly as a fingerprint betrays a criminal. Since then we have adopted the same method."

"Motorists whose tires have lost the effectiveness of their tread design are spotted by our assistants, detectives and invited to try the tread-print test."
