Since the close of the first World war there has been
a constant struggle between the elements endeavoring to introduce a measure of law and justice into international relations, and those content to place reliance in the traditional
method of unrestricted force. Foy some years the first
school of thought seemed to hold 6-brecarious advantage;
of late the second school has been progressively dominant.
It is not accidental that the growing reliance upon force
has coincided with increasing expectation of a second world
wer.

The Treaty of Versailles, unquestionably justified in The Treaty of Versailles, unquestionably justified in many of its punitive clauses, was foredomed by one intolerable mistake. It attempted to keep Germany in permanent and humiliated subjection to her conquerors. Timeless restrictions on the national armament, on the right to erect defenses and station troops on parts of German soil, we without precedent in history. It is entirely possible utterly to destroy a nation by a treaty of peace. But only on one condition is it possible to impose interminable restrictions upon a sovereign nation which is too strong to have its nativest identity winds out.

That essential condition is a mutual acceptance of the commitments in the first instance exacted from the defeated nation alone. Such commitments with regard to disarma-ment were accepted—but never fulfilled—by the victorious ment were accepted—out never lumined—by the victorious parties to the Treaty of Versailles. There were no similar qualifications of mutual demilitarization in the Locarno treaties. But the subsequent action of France in bordering the disarmed German frontier with a continuous line of forts was certainly at variance with the spirit of conciliation which Locarno sought.—WashingtongPost.
