FOR WORK TO BE CONSTRUCTED UNDER THE MOTOR FUEL TAX LAW.

1. Time and Place of Opening Bids Sealed proposals for the improvement of the thoroughfare described herein will be received at the office of the Council or President of the Board of Trustees of Barrington, Cook and Lake Counties, Illinois, until 8 o'clock P. M., Daylight Saving Time, September 14, 1936 and at that time publicly opened and read.

2. Description of Work (a) The proposed work is located on both sides of Main street from Cook street to Elia, also approximately 85 feet of similar widening on the north side of Main street west of Cook street.

(b) The proposed improvement is officially known as Extension to State Aid Route No. 109, Section No. 2 C. S., in the Village of Barrington, Illinois.

(c) The proposed improvement begins at Sta. 6.00 a point on the edge of the unimproved pavement of Main street west of Cook street, and extends in an easterly direction to Sta. 5.22, a total distance of 562 feet, of which 487 feet, (.92) miles are to be improved.

(d) The proposed improvement is to be widened roadway 48.42 feet wide, face to face of curbs.

3. Instruction to Bidders (a) Plans and specifications may be obtained from the Municipal Clerk or Municipal Engineer, for a specified length of time upon deposit of One Dollar (\$1.00),

which amount will be refunded upon return of both plans and specifications in good condition, within the time specified.

(b) Proposal forms may be obtained at the office of the Municipal Clerk, or at the office of the Municipal Engineer.

(c) All proposals must be accompanied by a bank cashier's check, or bank draft for ten (10) per cent of the amount of the bid, as provided in the "Standard Specifications for Road and Bridge Construction" prepared by the Department of Public Works and Buildings of the State of Illinois, and adopted by said Department July 11, 1932.

(d) Cement for this work will not be furnished by the Municipality.
