Lightning Causes Large Amount of Property Damage

Two Local Homes and Nearby Farms Incr Losses From Bolts

Two homes were struck by lightning bolts at approximately the same time last Sunday night, resulting in heavy damage to a vacant residence at 617 Sycamore avenue in Jewel park and damage of a lesser degree to the home of Ernest Wenzel, 208 Grove avenue.

The fire department has been commencing its work in handling the blaze by officials of the First National bank which owns the house. Firemen operated with a minimum of damage and confined the blaze to the attic.

The bolt that struck the Wenzel home followed through a lightning rod in the ceiling and left through a wall plug in the baseboard. The picture and decorations were damaged.

Two barns, one on the Charles T. Baumgardner farm on Harlett road and the other on the William Bohles farm, a mile southwest of Barrington on route 59 were burned after being struck by lightning Tuesday night. Volunteer firemen and the Barrington fire department succeeded in saving other buildings on both farms.

On the Baumgardner farm 60 tons of hay, 700 bushels of oats, 400 bushels of barley, several tons of dairy feed, and tools were destroyed. The horses and other livestock were saved by neighbors. The Bohles farm fire broke out about 11 o'clock Tuesday night and the barn together with its contents, including a car and a quantity of grain were destroyed. Several hogs also perished in the fire.

Fire caused by lightning was responsible also for the loss of a truck, four head of work horses and a large quantity of hay and grain when the farm barn at the Arlington Park jockey club race track was struck on fire and burned last Saturday night.

Former Resident Escapes Death as Lightning Strikes

Arthur Pakke, 379 Raymond street, Elgin, a former resident of Barrington, narrowly escaped death when he was knocked off an electric pole at Liberty and Little streets in Elgin early Sunday morning.

Mr. Pakke, who is employed as a lineman under the United Gas and Electric company, was engaged in repairing a power line when he was struck. He was up on the pole when the bolt struck near the intersection and falling from the pole, he was thrown 25 feet to the ground and was rendered unconscious by the lightning. He remained on the ground for some time before he regained consciousness.

An examination revealed a fractured shoulder, spinal injury and numerous bruises. His condition is reported to be improving.

Barrington Listed for \$50,000 Road Widening Project

Cook County Program for 1936 to Improve Main From Highway to Limits

Village President Earl Hatje and Village Trustee John J. Carroll revealed to the village board at a special meeting held in the village hall Monday night that Barrington is slated for a major road project in the 1937 program of Cook county.

The village officials received this assurance after conferences with William Buse, Cook county commissioner from Mount Prospect, and George A. Quillan, superintendent of Cook county highways, in Chicago Monday afternoon.

The road program of Cook county for 1937 includes a plan to widen Main street from Northwest highway to the west village limits. Mr. Quillan told Mr. Hatje and Mr. Carroll that the project was estimated to cost \$50,000.

The widening would be eight feet on each side of the present concrete strip on Main street. According to Mr. Quillan, the plans and project details have been sent to William Greer, Mitchell Kane, chief of the project under the public works administration by the first of next year.

Cook county highway heads expect to call for bids on the Barrington project in January of 1937 and estimate work will start in February of 1938.

The village board will continue with the widening project on Main street between Cook and Elia streets.

Cook County Program for 1936 to Improve Main From Highway to Limits

Village President Earl Hatje and Village Trustee John J. Carroll revealed to the village board at a special meeting held in the village hall Monday night that Barrington is slated for a major road project in the 1937 program of Cook county.

The village officials received this assurance after conferences with William Buse, Cook county commissioner from Mount Prospect, and George A. Quillan, superintendent of Cook county highways, in Chicago Monday afternoon.

The road program of Cook county for 1937 includes a plan to widen Main street from Northwest highway to the west village limits. Mr. Quillan told Mr. Hatje and Mr. Carroll that the project was estimated to cost \$50,000.

The widening would be eight feet on each side of the present concrete strip on Main street. According to Mr. Quillan, the plans and project details have been sent to William Greer, Mitchell Kane, chief of the project under the public works administration by the first of next year.

Cook county highway heads expect to call for bids on the Barrington project in January of 1937 and estimate work will start in February of 1938.
