Parents frequently are seen dragging their children across streets against red lights or right across in the middle of the block. It is wondered what children sometimes think of their parents. Five minutes after some parent has "told down the law" he can become a BIG HYPOCRITE. Last year there were more than 1,500 children under the age of four who were killed and 34,000 who were injured in automobile accidents. More than 3,200 between the ages of 5 and 14 were killed and nearly 140,000 were injured. It is important to teach young children to have safe habits and equally important for grownups to practice what they preach.

Work Delayed on New Funeral Home

Rainy weather and other unforeseen developments this week prevented starting work on a new funeral home for Danielson and Wilmering at 149 W. Main street just a crew of men employed by August Scherf is engaged in removing the present residence from that site to a location on West Main street. Soon after this is completed actual construction on the funeral home will start. The new funeral home is to be two stories high, of brick and wood construction, and with a four car garage in the rear. The building will be surrounded by a circular drive. The basement will contain a display room, heating plant, operating room, service lift to main floor and storage room. A ramp leading from the ground floor to the outside will be constructed at the rear. Entrance to the building on the main floor will be by a foyer and lobby facing Main street. The foyer will contain an office and will be of wood design with a terrace floor. A service room will extend along the west side of the building from the front to the rear. A hall with opening arches into the service room will divide the building and there will be another smaller service room and a music room on the east side. A family room to be used during services will extend across the back from the service room to the east side entrance. An entrance will also be made on the west side towards the rear where automobiles may be loaded at the time of a funeral. The second floor will contain living quarters and an awning covered car at the rear. Both the exterior and interior of the building are simple in design and construction and according to present plans, the decorating and furnishings will be harmonious. Robert Work is the architect.

Earl H. Kane Wins Neatest Farm Award

Besides winning an "award of merit" plaque for the second consecutive year, Earl H. Kane of Mundelein has the neatest dairy farm in district 7 of the Pure Milk association, it was revealed by officials of the Chicago-area's Neatest Dairy Farms contest Wednesday. His dairy farm will be known as the "Gold Medal Pure Milk" farm for district 7. Five other Pure Milk farms in district 7 were scored 90 per cent in neatness and will be awarded the "award of merit," while four others that were scored between 80 and 90 per cent in neatness will be given the "junior award" plaques.

The Earl H. Kane farm is located on two miles south of Mundelein on route 59. There Mr. Kane works his 140 acre farm and milks 25 cows. He also has about 25 heifers. By winning first place in the district contest, Kane is now eligible to compete for the grand championship of the nearest Pure Milk farms, the winner of which is now being selected from the district champions.

Creation of Petroleum Antedates Animal Life

Oil is of inorganic origin, having been created by the interaction of certain elements inside the earth's crust while that body was aging into its present condition. Another theory is that it is of organic origin. This latter is the most generally accepted and it has the bulk of evidence to support it even though most of it is circumstantial. According to this theory oil was formed through an unusual and gradual breaking up of vast amounts of organic matter. Some of this organic matter was plant life but most of it was animal life and microscopic animal life at that. Knowing the countless billions of gallons of petroleum that have been taken from the earth and knowing of the billions of gallons that still remain in the mighty subterranean reservoirs this might seem a bit incredible. But that is because we are unable to realize the extent of a million years or the number of animals that can live and die during that time. The process which eventually led to the creation of petroleum lasted hundreds of millions of years before the first bubble of gas grew or before the first bit of animal life moved about on dry land.—Pathfinder Magazine.
