Extend Deadline for Tax Payment

Reuben G. Plazge, deputy tax collector for the town of Barrington, announced Wednesday that an extension of time has been granted taxpayers in the country towns.

He stated that the books will be in Barrington until September 8, but not until September 29 in the impression held by some taxpayers. Originally the returnable date for the books was August 29 but by order of the county treasurer the delinquent date was put back to September 29. The country town books must be in Chicago by September 10, however.

A total of \$25,000 has been collected in real estate and personal property taxes to-date, and Mr. Plazge reported that the majority of property owners were paying both the first and second installments in full.

Townsend Club to Hold First Mass Meeting Friday

New Organization Sponsoring Gathering With Guest Speaker

A mass meeting of Townsend Recovery Plan Club No. 1 of the city will be held at the Club hall, 118 W. Station street, Friday evening at 8 o'clock. Prof. Valley, authorized Townsend speaker of Chicago, is expected to present to explain the Townsend plan and to answer questions and distribute literature.

Prof. Valley is one of the co-workers of the Townsend movement and has composed words a music for two Townsend songs which he will present on the program.

The preliminary steps to organizing the Barrington Townsend club were taken at a meeting held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. O. Eiters, 403 N. Cook street, Sunday evening. Eleven persons were present and it was decided to elect officers if possible at the meeting Friday night.

Mr. Eiters acted as chairman over the meeting and introduced H. Iverson of Evanston who discussed the Townsend plan and growth.

The meeting Friday night open to the public. Mr. Eiters stated, and questions concerning the movement will be answered and discussed if possible. He will be temporary chairman that evening and Mr. Iverson will be in charge of the entertainment. Miss Lyman will make periodic examinations of all students in regard to general health and will also examine each child returning to school after an absence of several days. She will be here Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

Miss Lyman has been engaged by the school board as part of a health program in keeping each child physically fit in order to obtain the best results from school work. Mr. Smith announced. By keeping a child in good condition he will be better able to get the maximum amount of education while attending classes, he stated.

Deadline to Pay Taxes Draws Near

Property owners in Barrington towns are warned by Reuben Plazge, deputy tax collector, that the deadline on paying taxes in the country towns is rapidly approaching. A number of persons have not availed themselves of the opportunity to make payments at Barrington and avoid trips to Chicago at a later date.

Mr. Plazge stated that the local books will be returnable to Chicago on September 9 and anyone wishing to make payment after that will have to go to the county clerk's office in Chicago.

Mrs. Louisa R. Coe, tax collector, reported Wednesday that collections to-date amount to \$140,000. It was also reported that the time extension granted on some tax books does not affect the country towns.
