CHILD'S PROSPECT AND FARM

An economist at the University of Wisconsin, Dr. O. E. Baker, expresses the sincere hope that his boy, now 6, will eventually be a farmer.

This is why, reasons the professor:

The farmer has better food, even in times of depression, than his city neighbors; he has better health; he can accumulate more property; he is more likely to enjoy his work than town people; finally, and most important, the farmer is more likely to rear a family and do his part to promote the general welfare of the nation.

From that viewpoint, this economist's ambition for his boy ought to be set up an example for many other urban fathers. In any event it is one bet in their children's future that parents cannot afford to overlook.

And incidentally, laying aside the customary jibes directed at farm life, agriculture, in the final analysis, is the nation's fundamental business.

THE CONSUMER SHOULD KNOW

In the belief that the general public, which ultimately pays all taxes anyway, should know what hidden assessments it is paying toward the cost of government, a growing number of manufacturers are calling attention to the hidden tax in the price of the products they sell.

One of the latest to adopt this measure is a New York laundry which has begun to add a flat two cents charge to each bundle of laundry to cover unemployment insurance and social security costs. A nationally known bakery is considering printing on the wrapper of each loaf of bread a notice that two cents of the purchase price of the bread is going to pay the cost of government.
