Tax Collection Is Reported Favorable

Tax collections for the town of Barrington amounted to \$55,000, Reuben Plagge, deputy collector, reported Wednesday and is the highest sum collected locally for several years. He also stated that personal property collections were the highest. He estimated that the amount collected for real estate and personal property taxes were in excess of 50 per cent of the outstanding tax due in the town of Barrington.

Mr. Plagge stated that property owners may still save themselves a trip to Chicago at a later date to pay their taxes by paying at the First National bank in the next day or so. The tax books were requested to be in the county clerk's office by September 10 but Mr. Plagge feels that he may be able to hold them in Barrington for a day or so, possibly until Saturday.

A \$75,000 building program has been started in the three rural divisions, Orchard Hills, Hills and Dale, and Lake of the Woods.

The first of five homes to be built this fall has been planned by Ralph Hussagh and Fred Hodgdon. It is a 15,000 home to be built along Brinker road south of the county line and in the Orchard Hills subdivision. An eight-room Colonial building, it will have white washed brick and clapboard exterior.

Four other homes are planned for this fall or early spring at an average cost of \$15,000 each. One of these will also be in Orchard Hills, two in Hills and Dale, and one in Lake of the Woods.
