

## "Yours for the Asking" Sunday Bill at Catlow

Shirley Temple Show Closes Friday; Bobby Brown Starred Saturday

"The Poor Little Rich Girl," now playing the local theatre, reveals little Shirley Temple in her most winsome role as she dances and sings her way through this delightful picture.

Motherless, lonely and unhappy in her palatial mansion, little Shirley walks away from it all; gets lost on the streets of New York; is befriended by an organ-grinder and finally is adopted by a vaudeville team.

Shirley dominates every scene in the picture; her grace and charm keep her on the wings of adventure.

Shirley's picture finishes its run Friday night. Another youngster, Bobby Brown, already known to millions of radio fans who have been thrilled by his singing on Eddie Cantor's weekly broadcasts, will be introduced to movie fans Saturday night, in "Let's Sing Again."
