Pure Milk Farm Given Price Rise for Grade A

Pure Milk association, shipping Grade A milk will receive a price differential of 8 cents per hundred pounds of 3.5 milk effective as of 1, 1936, association officials announced last week following discussions with Chicago milk butters.

This increase means that the Milk association dairy in shipping Grade A milk will receive 58 cents above the base condensatory price each month 100 per cent of their base ration allotment for one hundred pounds of milk testing 3.5 percent content. One hundred pounds of milk equals 4.5 gallons.
