

# Bronks Tie in Football Opener; To Meet Blue Devils Here Saturday

## Warren to Oppose Local Eleven in Conference Battle

0-0 Score Marks Contest With Niles Center in Heavy Rain Saturday

The Barrington Bronchos officially opened the 1936 football schedule by meeting the Niles Center eleven on the Barrington field Saturday afternoon and after 40 minutes of trying to score in an almost constant downpour saw the contest end in a scoreless tie.

The Bronchos entered the contest as a green outfit, the backs and line carrying a majority of new men in varsity competition. Niles Center was the aggressor throughout the game, pushing back into its territory repeatedly and threatening to score on several occasions.

**Slow on Offense**  
The Broncho line was slow in charging, allowing the Black-shirted Niles back to pierce the line and ends for consistent gains. With their backs to the wall, the Bronchos managed to show a sustained defense and took the ball on downs.

Niles Center made its greatest thrust in the third quarter but a line play failed to pick up the necessary half-yard for a first down on Barrington's five yard line. With the field in a sloppy condition, making trick plays impossible, both teams were content to follow the conservative type of game.

**Attempt Field Goals**  
With less than a minute to play in the first half, Grabenkort, Barrington left half back, attempted a field goal from the 25 yard line but the sodden ball refused to go over the bar although the distance and time were good.

Niles Center was forced to attempt the same play into the fourth quarter for a possible score. The ball was placed on the 25 yard line but ratty Bill Mountain, Broncho left tackle, broke through and smothered the kick.

**Little Passing**  
Few passes were attempted during the wet ball. Only one such pass was completed, from Grabenkort to left end Gaars for a gain of 12 yards. Three other tosses were incomplete. Niles Center also connected with one toss for 15 yards while throwing four bad ones.

Barrington penalized four times during the contest for a total of 20 yards while Niles lost 25 yards on three penalties. Niles Center made 11 first downs to Barrington's 7, which partially explains the fact that Niles made the greatest scoring threats.

Bob Caldwellwallard stood out during the last half of the game when his long punts took the ball off Barrington's danger zone on several times. Two of his punts were good for 40 yards, despite the condition of the ball and field.

**Warren Saturday**  
The Bronchos will make the initial bid for conference honors when the Blue Devils of Warren township high school at Gurnee come to Barrington Saturday.
