"Mary of Scotland" to Show for Three Days; "Green Pastures" Screening

With "The Green Pastures" now playing, "His Brother's Wife" scheduled for Sunday and Monday and "Mary of Scotland" announced for next Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, local moviegivers have three of the season's outstanding productions offered.

The background of "The Green Pastures" is formed by imaginative spectacles of biblical lore. The Creation, the Flood, Moses leading the Israelites to Freedom, Hezekiah's warlike defense of the Walls of Jericho and the Crucifixion.

"We Went to College" is next in the program of current hitings and will be screened Saturday night. Among the stars in this feature is Edith Atwater, daughter of Mrs. Harold Pynchon of Barrington.

Co-starred with her are Charles Hutterworth, Una Merkel, Hugh Herbert and Walter Catlow.

Major Bowes with a new group of amateur aspirants will add to the interest of the Saturday bill. This, with Pathé News, Travelogue and the regular 9 p. m. gift event will combine to round out an evening of entertainment.

The Sunday-Monday picture, "His Brother's Wife," is far from being a triangle drama set in a modernistic drawing room. Its story tells of a life-long quest for a serum to control the dread spot, fever, and leads its characters into the jungle, with its mysteries and terrors.

Robert Taylor and Barbara Stanwyck make this tale of adventure-romance a really important film. With the aid of Jean Harlow, Joseph Calleia and John Eckridge, the knotty problems are solved, and the characters sail into smooth waters.

Short subjects preceding the feature are a color cartoon, later news and band act.

"Star for a Night," the bargain offering for Tuesday, revolves around two chorus girls and their blind mother. They have led the mother to believe they are stars on Broadway, but what happens when the mother comes to New York for a visit makes a telling feature of this film.
