Speakers Discuss Tuberculosis Tax

Various civic clubs, parent-teacher associations, and women's clubs throughout Lake county are being contacted during the next two weeks by speakers sent out from the Lake county Tuberculosis association to familiarize members with the provisions of the sanatorium law which will be voted on at the general election in November.

The sanatorium or Glackin law, as it is known, is a law of the state of Illinois which empowers the county board of each county to establish and maintain a county tuberculosis sanatorium, or to pay for the care of tuberculosis cases in a sanatorium elsewhere in the state, by levying a tax not to exceed one and one-half mills.
