OFFICIAL PUBLICATION

ORDINANCE NO. 157
 AN ORDINANCE OF THE VILLAGE OF BARRINGTON, COOK AND LAKE COUNTIES, ILLINOIS, PROHIBITING THE MAKING OF ANY NEW CONNECTIONS AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF.

SECTION I. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined a sum not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100.00, and each day upon which the said violation continues shall be and constitute a distinct and separate offense.

SECTION VIII. Brepel. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

SECTION IX. Effect. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and due publication hereof, as required by law.

Bronchos Take Second Defeat in Conference Football; Lose to Grant 6-0

The local Bronchos again suffered defeat when they met the football eleven from Grant high school on Grant's field at Fox Lake Friday afternoon. Grant held the Bronchos to a 6-0 score. Grant used Friday's game was a well balanced game from the standpoint of playing, both teams being about equal. Grant kicked off sending the ball deep into Barrington's territory where it was returned for a short distance. Grant utilized numerous fast line plays working the ball up to Barrington's goal post base. Grant scored the only touchdown of the game in the first quarter. The ball was on the 5 yard line; sharp, Grant's hefty full back, took the ball and plunged through the line of scrimmage to score. Grant attempted to punt for the extra point but failed.

The entire game was played in a see-saw fashion, both teams being on the verge of scoring several times. Barrington was in a scoring position several times but failed because the receiver could not hang on to the slippery ball. The Bronchos succeeded in finding holes in Grant's line advancing the ball frequently. In the last quarter Grant punted and Barrington returned the ball deep into Grant's half; at the first whistle the bronchos held the ball on their own 15 yard line.

Barrington had the edge on Grant in first downs and penalties. The home boys had ten first downs to the opponents eight. Grant was punished six for 40 yards. Barrington was set back 3 to 15 yards.

Jack Mountain, one of Barrington's dependable tacklers, received an injured shoulder in Friday's game and will be out of the line-up for two or three weeks which is rather a setback to the team. Mountain will probably be back in time for the homecoming game with Libertyville October 21.
