

Local Pastors Are Joining National Preaching Mission

Plan Eight-Day Session at Conclusion of Other Programs

A series of articles pertaining to the National Preaching Mission being conducted in many parts of the country is to be published by the Barrington Review and will be written by members of the Barrington Ministerial association.

The first of the series of articles was written by Rev. Hermann E. Knott, pastor of St. Paul Episcopal church, and is as follows: "This fall a National Preaching Mission is being conducted in many strategic centers which eventually is scheduled to bring a score or more of nationally famous preachers into 25 of the larger cities of our country."

It is to dramatize the fact before our nation that Christians are convinced that the promise of Almighty God, "My Word shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please," is as true and potent today as it ever was.

Christians workers realize and appreciate the fact that the preaching of God's Word, Sunday after Sunday, from the various pulpits throughout the country, and the breadth of our land cannot be supplanted by one united effort such as this National Preaching Mission. Nor is that the purpose of the mission. Its aim is to emphasize the unshaken faith of Christians in the power of the spoken Word of God, in the confident expectation that such a united demonstration will bring about that many who have become discouraged in the pursuit of the missionary thrills and satisfactions of life that they have no time or interest in the Word of God, may be won to a renewed study of the Bible and a rededication to the teachings of the faith by God in His Holy Word.

It is Chicago the National Preaching Mission will be held November 1-8. From the bulletin of the Federation of Churches we learn that there will be approximately 20 of the great preachers of our own and other lands visiting Chicago during those days and preaching in strategic centers, conducting seminars for ministers and laymen as well as young people.

Following the Chicago Preaching Mission, the cooperating churches of Barrington will sponsor an eight-day preaching mission for our village. The dates have been definitely set for the week beginning Sunday, Nov. 29, and continuing each night (excepting Saturday) until Sunday evening, December 6. The local ministerial union requests all organizations of our community who are interested in the spiritual and moral welfare of our village to give the best preaching mission the right of way that week. We are convinced that great good will come from this united effort and we want you to share in it.

In subsequent articles pastors of this village will discuss the preaching mission and its purpose as they see it. They will also keep you informed concerning the details of the plans as they take more definite shape from week to week. Please look for these articles, read them and pray for the success of the most important undertaking in our community.

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Welfare Commission Reports on Pensions

The Lake county Welfare commission of Public Welfare has prepared statistics covering the amount of work done in the period ending October 12, 1936, and starting April, 1936.

The commission has considered 1160 applications for old age assistance since that time and 701 applications have been approved and sent to Springfield, the balance having been lost through disapproval, withdrawals, deaths and cases deferred for various reasons.

The average state award per person in Lake county is \$14.22.

At the present time investigators are working on 317 cases that are awaiting proof of various kinds. The chairman of the commission, George D. Meyer, reports the work is being handled as rapidly as possible at present.

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
