

T. B. Tax in Lake County Is General Election Proposal

Proposition to Establish a Sanatorium on Ballot for November 3

Residents of Lake county will vote upon the establishment of a tuberculosis sanatorium in Lake county at the general election November 3.

The proposition calls for approval of a bond issue of \$1,000,000 to be used for the purchase of land and construction of a sanatorium.

The proposition has been adopted by the county board of supervisors and a resolution calling for the referendum was adopted by that group following the presentation of a petition signed by more than one hundred legal voters of the county June 8.

The ballot issue issued by the Lake county Tuberculosis association upon the favorable passage of the proposition the following statements were made:

"The Lake county Tuberculosis association has 100 cases of tuberculosis on its files and there are but 23 beds in the county hospital for the care of tuberculosis patients."

"The estimated cost of handling tubercular patients in a sanatorium in its early stages because of the danger of infection to other members of the family and community. Once in a sanatorium the patient can be taught to live with his disease so that the sanatorium routine may be carried into the home when the patient is released."

In presenting the estimated cost of handling tubercular patients the association reported that the patient could be cared for at a daily expense of \$2.14 which would include surgical treatment.

Pastor of Old Barrington Center Church 42 Years Ago Coming Back to Conduct Services Next Sunday

Once the hub of the Barrington community, now a monument to pioneer Yankee and German farmers of Northwest Cook county, the Barrington Center church will



be restored to activity next Sunday when Rev. Thomas E. Beam, pastor of that little church and of the Methodist Episcopal church of Barrington 42 years ago, will conduct services.

Many of the early residents of the community and all others who wish to attend will comprise the congregation.

Some of the early residents still live in Barrington township and village while others make their homes in Elgin. The plan of holding services there originated with some of the latter group.

The Rev. Mr. Beam, now retired, was pastor of the Methodist church at Dundee until recently. He is well known to older residents of this community.

Although Barrington Center church is now only a deserted little country church building resting on a plot of ground north of 62-A, three miles southwest of Barrington, it has been a

center of activity on several occasions during the last few years. In 1931 it was renovated to be used as the setting for a rustic wedding.

In May, 1932, a large granite boulder was placed alongside the building and on Decoration Day of that month and year, a bronze plaque was placed on the boulder, dedicating the monument to those boys of the 60's who enlisted in the Union army at that place. The church had been used as a recruiting station for the rural community during the Civil war.

Last Day to Register Tuesday, Oct. 27, will be the last day for residents of Lake county to register for election. Those who have voted at the last election or the last primaries need not re-register.

E. D. Prouty was born on the crest of the hill where the old Palestine, Lake Zurich and Wauwaukegan railroad crosses the highway in 1874. He moved to Barrington township and purchased a 140 acre farm from Monroe Waterman, uncle of Frank Waterman of this village.

Mr. Prouty became his bride October 29, 1912. Her maiden name was Marion Louisa Williams and her family moved into this region from Monstow, Wis., her birthplace. Her father, Aiden G. Williams, later moved back to Wisconsin.

While farming in Barrington township Mr. Prouty served as highway commissioner for 12 consecutive years.

Mr. Prouty and George Jencks purchased the farm implement business owned by the late Judge Fred Frey, located on Main street where the Pohlman building now stands, and the Proutys moved to Barrington.
