Double Liability on Bank Stock to Stop July 1, 1937

First National Joins Others in Terminating Old Regulation

The double liability on capital stock in the First National Bank of Barrington will terminate July 1, 1937, as the result of a decision by the board of directors at a recent meeting and advertised in this Review this week.

This is in conformity with the revised national banking laws providing all national banks to withdraw the double liability of their stockholders. State banking laws of most of the states have been altered to permit this change, and the result of these revisions, national and state, are that the majority of large and small banks are taking advantage of the new law. The double liability provision for banks has been in effect 90 years. It was supposed to protect the interests of depositors, but during the various banking crises proved of little value in stabilizing institutions.

A crowd of 400 democrats from Barrington and Cuba towns attended a joint rally at the public school auditorium Wednesday night to hear Harold Ward, state senator, defend the party, national and state administration.
