New Automobiles Go on Display in Show Rooms Here

Most 1937 Models on Hand. A Few Will Come Next Week

Local automobile dealers have announced, this week and earlier, the new 1937 models of their respective lines, with most of the new cars already on the display floor and others to be presented to the public within a week or two. Brewer Motor Sales has announced the new 1937 Plymouth cars with a list of new features to command the interest of the motoring public. Standard Motor Co. also has placed the 1937 Plymouth on the floor. In appearance, these cars are progressions of the 1936 machines with roomier bodies, more streamlined lines and many new features. The Standard Motor Co. will have new Chrysler cars on display in a week or ten days. Brewer Motors have one of the new De Soto on hand, a strikingly modern appearing car with a decided change of lines and many new features. The Lincoln Zephyr advertises the "flowing ride", comfort. The 1937 Ford will be announced within a short time. Schaible Brothers and Collins offer variety with the Silver Streak Pontiac of 1937; and the 1937 Buick in four outstanding models. All of the Buicks have larger, more powerful motors and roomier bodies. The body lines are advanced and striking. Following on the heels of two highly successful years, Pontiac enters the 1937 automobile year with two lines of cars (deluxe six and deluxe eight) that are longer in wheelbase, roomier, have even more pleasing in appearance, improved in comfortable riding qualities, with larger and more powerful engines, faster acceleration and higher top speed. Chevrolet in the company's quarter-century of automobile manufacture will make their bow here and throughout the country on November 7. Fred Schaible, of the Schaible Chevrolet Sales, announced this week when his return from Chicago where 160 dealers from this section obtained official news of the product from R. W.
