File School Suit in Cook County Superior Court

Case Returnable December 7; Started for Division of Funds

Filing of the brief in the suit against school trustees of Barrington and Cuba townships was completed this week by D. E. Maloney, village attorney, he announced at the board meeting in the village hall Monday evening.

He stated the case was returnable for the first Monday in December. The suit was filed in the superior court of Cook county by order of the village board in view of the fact that the village is in a financial straits and the trustees of the school districts and the village at the time the First State Bank of Barrington closed.

Trustee H. D. A. Grebe reported to the board Monday that the Pure Oil company officials had tentatively approved plans for widening the intersection of Main and Hough streets by removing the light pole, water plug and moving the sidewalk back on the south-west corner of the intersection.

The plan to widen the street was suggested by engineers from the state highway department at a conference with Mr. Grebe several years ago. When the plan has been drafted, the oil company reported it could grant the necessary easements, Mr. Grebe stated.

Historical Story of Settling Early Barrington Community Reprinted

Feeling that the early history of the settling of Barrington and its community is still of great public interest, the Barrington Review is again presenting an historical account by William M. Landwer from the history as related by his father, Garrett H. Landwer. It was published five years ago in the Barrington Review.



In that year Jesse F. Miller and William Van Oradal arrived and settled temporarily on the school section on account of the timber thereon. When they came there were about 500 Indians in the grove of the Pottawatomie tribe. The Indians soon retired and subsequently only visited the town in smaller numbers at more and more distant periods.

There appear to have been no other settlers in 1834 but in 1835 Benjamin Irick arrived and settled on Section 20. Henry Clawson settled on Section 2 and Phillip Hawley arrived and settled on Section 12. In 1836 John McKnight settled on Section 17 and Samuel Swadlow on Section 29. In 1837 Mrs. Bucklin settled on Section 19. Freeman Martin on Section 2, Benj. Richardson and G. A. Applebee on Section 5 and Chas. D. Miller on Section 16. William Ott and family, Dr. Hall, Thomas Perkins, John Giddings and Horace Rouscarrans arrived in the town during this year. In 1838 L. & E. Manning and George S. Browning settled on Section 19, Henry Smith on Section 5, Alvin Miller and his three sons on Section 16 and Homer Wilmarth on Section 17. In 1840 Lyman Dunklee settled on Section 22, Moses Hammond on Section 29, Hezekiah Kingsley and his son J. W. Kingsley on Section 21 and S. W. Kingsley on Section 29. In 1841 John C. Allen and P. N. Gould settled on Section 21 and Nelson and Daniel Mosser on Section 28. In 1842 George T. Waterman settled on Section 21 and S. W. Slade on Section 20. In 1843 Chas. Church and sons settled on Section 23. In 1844 John Hendrickson and in 1847 Henry Mundhenke Sr. came into the township.
