J. M. Friedlander, president of the First National Bank of Barrington, and C. A. Elsner, cashier of the same institution, attended the second annual conference sponsored by the Illinois Bankers association at the University of Illinois at Urbana Monday afternoon of this week. Mr. Elsner reported the big light of the conference was the course sponsored by the association in banking matters for bank officials, students attending the conference at the University of Illinois at Urbana Monday afternoon and the public. He stated that the changing policies of banking as the move with the economic world were the chief items of discussion. Men who took leading parts in the discussion were Professor Frederick H. Lee, professor of economics at Illinois; Col. Charles Pope, president of First Bank of Chicago; and Dr. Walter Lichtenstein.
