

"Sing Baby Sing" Week-End Feature for Movie Patrons

"Anthony Adverse" Starts Run Wednesday; Double Bill Tuesday Night

Little Jane Withers and her two new screen pals, Fred C. Cobb and Slim Summerville, form a triumvirate of merry-makers in "Pepper," playing the local theatre Friday night.

On the surface, Jane is the mischievous terror of lower New York, but actually she is a half-pint Robin Hood, who fights for her poor friends, rights wrongs, cures a dyspeptic old millionaire and exposes a gang of fakirs posing as nobility.

Gold Star Truck Damaged by Fire Thursday Morning

A Gold Star Motor Service tractor and trailer loaded with merchandise and driven by Joseph Burdloff was heavily damaged on
