Jack V. Miller, police chief of Glenview, died at the Sherman hospital Sunday afternoon of injuries received when the car he was driving collided with one driven by Miss Joan Volence, 2024 S. 52nd street, Chicago, at the intersection of Barrington and Algonquin roads early Sunday morning.

An inquest was opened at Elgin Monday morning by Coroner H. J. Vierge who continued the investigation pending the outcome of the inquest received by other occupants of the two cars.

Hundreds of motorists from northwest Cook and southwest Lake counties have stopped to visit the Justice farm lake in Barrington town since the report was circulated that thousands of geese and ducks are utilizing the place as a preserve and haven.

Among the wild geese are the rare "snow" variety as well as the large Canadian geese. The wild ducks include mallards, teal, spoonbills, black ducks, pin tails, canvas-backs and other varieties. Village President Proposes Several New WPA Projects

Introduces Suggestions at Meeting Monday; Plans Local Improvements

A proposal that the village board sponsor several projects under the federal works program administration was made by Village President Hart Hatje at the regular meeting Monday night.

He listed a number of items that he felt could be done with labor and financial assistance from the federal government. Included in his list was a plan to grade parkways and fill them with black dirt and seed where necessary.

This project, he reported, is necessary to place parkways in condition following the digging done this summer in installing the new sewer systems. His plan calls for the use of black dirt as top dressing and seeding bare spots.

He also recommended a project for trimming trees in the village. Under this proposal the dead branches would be trimmed and trees treated. Only trees in parkways would be cared for in the project.

President Hatje also suggested a project to repair broken sidewalks and fill them with black dirt. He stated that as a safety measure for residents the village board should make an effort to repair sidewalks that have been broken or cracked and sunk.

"End Delinquency by Creating Jobs," Says Judge Braud

Speaker Tells Work of Boys' Court at P.T.A. Meeting

"You don't save boys by sending them to jail," Judge J. B. Braud of the Boys' Court, Chicago, told an audience of more than 400 members and guests in the P.T.A.-Teacher association at the school auditorium Monday evening.

For that reason, I try to avoid giving a boy a record. In one year, 60 per cent of those given a second chance made good."

Judge Braud then outlined the factors which contribute to juvenile delinquency, stressing idleness and unemployment as the most important. Among other factors he mentioned was:
