Local Schools to Close for Holiday Starting Thursday
Pupils of the Barrington public and St. Anne parochial schools will enjoy a two-day holiday Thanksgiving Day and the following Friday of next week, according to announcements made by R. S. Smith, superintendent of public schools, and Father P. J. Hayes, pastor of St. Anne.

In addition to the Thanksgiving holiday announcement, Superintendent Smith stated that Christmas holidays for the public schools would be from December 23 until January 4.
Mr. Smith and T. C. Hoeford, assistant principal of the high school, will attend a conference for teachers at Northwestern University at Evanston Friday and a large group of instructors will attend the sessions Saturday. A meeting of principals of schools in the Northwest conference is being held Wednesday afternoon and evening.
Miss Annette Sheel, instructor for Junior high school, is arranging a program for a Christmas party to be given by pupils of that section for their parents December 11. An all-high school party is being planned for December 12.

Suggests Precincts for Local Elections
Village Clerk A. C. Burandt introduced a question of dividing the village into two precincts for municipal elections at the regular meeting of the board Monday night.
Mr. Burandt recommended the change to help relieve the too heavy duty on the shoulders of judges and clerks at the elections. At the last one 1500 votes were polled.
He stated that at the village election next April there will be a complete slate of trustees, six vacancies with a possibility of several candidates for each office. The office of village president and village clerk is also open for election as is the office of police magistrate.
Members are to be elected to the library board at the same time as there will be two vacancies for that organization.
On the basis of the total number of offices on the ballot for the April election, Mr. Burandt reported the job of tallying will be heavy. It was suggested by members of the board to make the division of the village by counting Cook and Lake, for the precincts. The board took the matter under advisement.
