Bronchos Lose Last Conference Game to Leyden

Leyden Scores Against Locals in Third Period; Drive for Tie Falls

Football fans witnessed one of the hardest played games of the conference season Saturday as the Leyden Eagles took their final victory of the season at Dodge Hill, defeating the Bronchos 15-0.

The Bronks played an excellent game Saturday making the Eagles work hard for their victory. Several of the Eagles declared that the Bronks were the toughest opposition that they had run onto this year.

The first quarter was mostly a matter of both teams attempting to gain ground fast. Barrington had the wind with them and succeeded in getting the ball on Leyden's 20 yard line. Grabenkort tried a field goal, but was unsuccessful.

In the second period Leyden had a series of fast line plays and a steady march into the Bronk territory. The Eagles worked the pigskin up to the Bronk 15 yard mark. Here Marzulo took a lateral from Sewski and went around right end taking the ball over the goal. The officials, however, claimed it invalid as Marzulo was brought to his knees before the run was completed.

In the third quarter Leyden kicked off to Barrington's goal but was unsuccessful in scoring. Both teams punted a great deal to gain ground. The Eagles took the ball on their own 30 yard marker and attempted to pass. Kincaid rushed in taking the pass for a gain of 15 yards. For a moment it looked as if he were going to score, but he was downed on the 15 yard line.

 With no score and none in view the Eagles took down the field with some hopes of a touchdown. The ball was on the Bronks' 15 yard mark when Wislomesky, a fast full back, got loose on an end and carrying the leather to the 10 yard line. With three minutes to play Sewski took the ball and scored right end to score. No play after touchdown was scored.
 The Bronks made a vain effort to tie the score. Catcher returned the kick off for 15 yards. He then passed to Gaare for a gain of 31 yards. Grabenkort then passed to Shepard who took the pigskin for 13 yards. The game ended with Barrington on Leyden's 30 yard line.
