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Preaching Mission of Local Church Nov. 29 to Dec. 1

Rev. F. Frankfield is Guest Speaker; Ministerial Assn. Speaker The Barrington Ministerial association has completed its plans for the eight-day preaching mission to be held in the Day Methodist, Salem and St. Paul churches starting November 29 and closing December 6.
Reverend Herman Koehn, pastor of St. Paul church and president of the Ministerial association has written an article outlining the program and the history of the speaker. The article is: "Following closely upon the precedent of successful preaching missions held the past week in Chicago, the protestant Christian leaders of our village are arranging a preaching mission for Barrington. It is hoped that the spirit of consecration and reconciliation to the principles of Christianity which was so manifest at Chicago may also be transferred to our community.
"The first service will be at the Baptist church Sunday evening, Nov. 29, 7:30 o'clock. We hope to fill this church to overflowing at the first preaching mission service. Provisions are being made to install a loud speaker in the church basement so that at overflowed church should we all may hear the speaker participate in the service. Subsequent evening services will be at the Baptist church Sunday evening, Nov. 29, 7:30 o'clock; Monday evening, Nov. 30, 7:30 o'clock; Tuesday, Methodist church, Wednesday and Thursday, St. Paul church; Friday and Saturday evening, Salem church. The weekday services are scheduled to begin at 7:45 and the Sunday services at 7:15. The attention is not only invited to the village to participate in preaching mission but also to friends of the village who may not have found it, able to arrange for a private mission of their own.
"The past year of the cooperating churches have succeeded in enlisting the services of one of our outstanding leaders in professional life to bring the message in eight services, namely, the Rev. Frederick Frankfield, LL.D., pastor of St. Peter's Episcopal church, Elmhurst; St. Peter's college, Elmhurst; previously coming to Elmhurst several years ago, Dr. Frankfield served in important churches at Orleans and at Rochester, N. Y. When Dr. Frankfield left the Elmhurst Evangelical church at Elmhurst, its membership had grown to over 3000 souls. Sunday afternoons Dr. Frankfield taught men's Bible class which during the Lenten season attracted 600 men each Sunday. During the day school enrollment at St. Peter's church was over 2500. To be and accommodate this vast number of boys and students, many women, a large three story parsonage was erected at a cost some \$175,000.
"Not only is Dr. Frankfield an able administrator, he also a heart-searching preacher, accepting the gospel of our Lord his guide through life, he brings the message it has in such a that all who care can understand and accept its implications.
G. Atkins Held to Grand Jury in Au Fatality October George F. Atkins, of Barrington and Dayton, O., was held to grand jury of a charge of manslaughter Saturday by the county coroner's jury investigating a fatal automobile accident which occurred near Berwyn, Ill.
Arto J. Shirk, Bloomington, his bride of four days, the Leonora Evans of Seward, was captain of a machine which killed with one driver by Mrs. Atkins. Shirk died as a result his injuries and his wife is recovering.
Testimony given at the inquest Saturday indicated that Mr. Atkins had driven into an intersection while the traffic light was in favor of Shirk.
Mr. Atkins was taken into official custody following the accident and later released with \$5000 bond. His mother, Emma Atkins, was a passenger in his car at the time of the accident.
