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**Preaching Mission
of Local Churches
Nov. 29 to Dec. 6**

Rev. F. Frankfeld is Guest
Speaker; Ministerial
Assn. Speaker

The Harrington Ministerial Association has completed its plans for the eight-day preaching mission to be held in the Baptist, Methodist, Salem and St. Paul churches starting November 29 and closing December 6.

Reverend Hermann Koehn, pastor of St. Paul church and president of the Ministerial association, has written an article outlining the program and the history of the speaker. The article is being followed closely upon the unprecedentedly successful preaching mission held the past week in Chicago, the Protestant Christian leaders of our village are arranging a preaching mission for Harrington. It is hoped that the spirit of consecration and recovery of the principles of Christianity which was so manifest at Chicago may also be transferred to our community.

The first service will be held at the Baptist church Sunday evening, Nov. 29, 7:30 o'clock. We hope to fill the church to overflowing at this first preaching mission service. Provisions are being made to install a loud speaker at the church basement so that an overflow crowd should speak as all may hear the speaker and participate in the service. On subsequent evenings services are to be held as follows: Monday and Tuesday, Methodist church; Wednesday and Thursday, St. Paul church; Friday and Saturday evening, Salem church. The week-day services are scheduled to begin at 7:45 and the Sunday services at 7:30. The association not only invites all people of the village to participate in its preaching mission but also the friends from other communities who may not have found it possible to arrange for a preaching mission of their own.

The pastors of the cooperating churches have succeeded in enlisting the services of one of the outstanding leaders in Protestantism to bring the message in each of eight services, namely, the Rev. Frederick Frankfeld, L.L.D., pastor of St. Peter's Evangelical church, Elmhurst. St. Peter's is the college church affiliated with Elmhurst college. Frankfeld is coming to Elmhurst several years ago. Dr. Frankfeld served large and important churches at New Orleans and at Rochester, N. Y. When Dr. Frankfeld left St. Paul Evangelical church at Rochester, its membership had grown to over 3000 souls. Sunday at St. Paul, Dr. Frankfeld taught a men's Bible class which during the Lenten season attracted some 400 men each Sunday. At the day school enrollment at St. Paul church was over 2400. To house and accommodate this vast number of boys and girls of men and women, a large three story parish house was erected at a cost of some \$175,000.

Not only is Dr. Frankfeld an able administrator, he also is a heart-searching preacher. Accepting the gospel of our Lord as his guide through life, he brings the message it has in such a way that all who care can understand and accept its implications.

G. Atkins Held to Grand Jury in Auto Fatality October 27

George F. Atkins, of Barrington and Dayton, O., was held to the grand jury on a charge of manslaughter Saturday by a county coroner's jury investigating a fatal automobile accident which occurred near Berwyn October 27.

Arlo J. Shirk, Bloomington, and his bride of four days, the former Donna Evans of Seward, were occupants of a machine which collided with one driven by Mr. Atkins. Shirk died as a result of his injuries and his wife is now recovering.

Testimony given at the inquest Saturday indicated that Mr. Atkins had driven into an intersection while the traffic light was in favor of Shirk.

Mr. Atkins was taken into technical custody following the accident and later released on a \$5000 bond. His wife, Mrs. Emma Atkins, was a passenger in his car at the time of the accident.

Two Youths Drown When Car Plunges Into Creek Pool

F. Selzer and R. Christie Trapped Under Auto Wednesday

Two youths met a tragic death early Wednesday morning when their roadster automobile plunged into a culvert bridge into a shallow creek pool west of Dundee. Victims of the tragedy were both drowned while trapped beneath the wreckage.

They are: Robert Christie, 25 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Christie, who lived on the game farm owned by Dr. Paul Magnuson southwest of Barrington; and Francis Selzer, 19 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. William F. Selzer of Crystal Lake, who resided with his brother on Higgins road in Kane county.

Examination revealed that the bodies bore slight injuries and it was believed the youths were drowned while under the wreckage beneath the surface of the water which is about two feet deep.

The victims attended a party at Stark's Station, 10 miles west of Dundee, Tuesday night and are reported to have been en route home when the accident occurred.

They left the party about 1 o'clock Wednesday morning. In the car, Christie is thought to have been at the wheel of the machine when the accident occurred.

State Highway Patrolman Herbert Wright and William Gallagher, who investigated, advanced the theory that Christie fell asleep while driving.

The car swerved off the highway and over a culvert, turning upside down in the pool of water which is about four feet below the road level.

Christie reportedly noticed the wreck early Wednesday morning and tried to get out of the car. Both youths were employed at Stark's Station.

Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

There is no corporal punishment at Moosehart, the dean explained. Children are punished for misdemeanors by being deprived of privileges. All receive a weekly allowance and are permitted to select their own clothes. Most problems concern trivial things in the eyes of adults but vital ones to the children—such as the age at which a boy may wear long trousers, he said.

All pupils are given a chance to show special talents. The boys are taught a trade. A psychologist assists with planning suitable courses of study, a corps of doctors and a physical hospital, Elgin, house mothers provide loving care.
