

Charles Drussel Named President of College Class

Sophomore Classmates Elect Him Leader at Bradley Tech at Peoria

Charles Drussel, son of Rev. and Mrs. Charles R. Drussel, 407 Grove avenue, was honored by classmates when he was elected president of the sophomore class of Bradley school of Technology, Peoria, at school elections this week.

The election was made further impressive, a bulletin from the school reported, by the large plurality he received compared with other nominees registered in the races for various offices at the school.

The election attracted a great deal of interest on the campus and voting was unusually heavy, the report stated. Balloting took place under the supervision of the student council.

Charles' popularity on the campus is due to other activities in which he has participated during the two years there. It was learned at the present time, he is assistant manager of student employment, a member of the Commerce club, gives club and school numbering 40 pieces.

State School for Boys Seeks Foster Homes in Locality

In a campaign to find foster homes for boys from the State School for Boys at St. Charles, representatives have been contacting newspapers and group leaders in all sections of the state.

E. B. Pankratz, foster-home placement department, was in Barrington last week and issued the following statement that explained in part the program:

"Each boy considered for foster-home placement has completely and carefully arranged program at the school with credit to himself.

"Before actual placement is made a boy's case is passed upon by a foster-home placement committee made up of a group of individuals foremost in Chicago's industrial child welfare agencies. Previous to this the advisability of placement is considered by the school staff committee.

"Following his placement, an experienced man case worker makes semi-monthly supervisions at the foster home to assist the foster mother when needed in the control of a particular boy. He will pay \$20 per month board and \$5 per month for clothing and other incidentals.

"We are especially interested in foster homes where high school possibilities exist. Previous we are just as interested in foster homes from small town homes as from large town homes.

Compile Statistics Concerning Health of School Children

A health survey of grade school children from kindergarten through eighth grade has been completed by Miss A. Lyman, registered nurse at Barrington public school, from information given by parents of the children on cards furnished by the school.

A total of 466 cards were returned to Miss Lyman bearing the requested information concerning the number of sicknesses each child had had.

A report on immunization showed two were treated against whooping cough, or four percent of those not having had the disease previously. For scarlet fever the total was 39, or six per cent. Immunization for diphtheria was 102, or 22 per cent.

Following are the totals and percentages for children having been quarantined for a specific disease: whooping cough, 219 or 47 per cent; scarlet fever, 112 or 24 per cent; diphtheria, 2 or 4 per cent; measles, 352 or 75 per cent; chicken pox, 259 or 56 per cent; mumps, 215 or 46 per cent. Vaccinations numbered 11, or 3.4 per cent while 75 received the Schick test for diphtheria and 49 received the Dick test for scarlet fever.

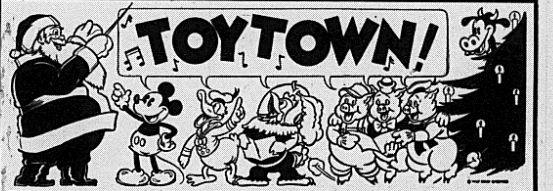
