1 Dead, 6 Hurt in Auto Accident Saturday Evening

H. Hohmeyer of Ontarioville Victim of Crash; Two Seriously Hurt. Henry Hohmeyer, 64 years of age, an Ontarioville mail carrier, was killed outright and six persons were injured, two seriously, in a two-car collision which occurred at the intersection of Barrington and Golf roads in Schaumburg township early Saturday evening.

Mr. Schumacher and his wife, Lillie, 46, Benjamin Pehm, 43, and two girls, Erna, 18, and daughter of Hohmeyer, Mrs. Dorothy Connell, 57, Normal Heights, Ill., a niece of Mrs. Connell, Mr. and Mrs. Schumacher were the most seriously injured of the survivors. The former's condition has improved while the latter is still in a critical state, authorities at the Sherman hospital. Pehm, where the injured were taken by ambulance, reported that an inquest into the death of Hohmeyer was opened at a funeral chapel, 203 S. Cook street, Monday afternoon by E. R. Stein, deputy coroner from Cook county, but it was postponed on December 23 to await testimony from injured persons.

Mr. Schumacher and his wife were traveling west on Golf road and Pehm, accompanied by his wife, Hohmeyer, Mrs. Connell and the Hartman girl, was driving north on Barrington road when the crash occurred. Pehm told State Highway Patrolman William Gallacher who investigated the accident that he stopped for the stop sign at the intersection of the two highways and started across, failing to see the Schumacher car approaching from the east. Schumacher's car struck Pehm's at the right door and rolled it over, hurling its occupant to the pavement and into a ditch. Schumacher's car did not overturn but rammed into the front end of the Pehm car, resting on its side on the shoulder of the road near the other machine. Hohmeyer, who was in the front seat, was dead when picked up. The injured were taken to Elgin for treatment. At first it was feared some of them might not survive, but their conditions were reported as having improved.

Mr. Hohmeyer was born in Lacon county August 13, 1870 and has been a resident of Ontarioville for the last 35 years. He is survived by the daughter, Mrs. Pehm, a son, William O. Ontarioville; two sisters, Mrs. Louise Tompe of Lake Zurich and Mrs. Christine Halle of Long Grove and two brothers, William C. Chicago and Charles J. of Mt. Prospect.

F. Shoppe, Brother of Mrs. M. Hatje, Buried Saturday. Frank Shoppe, who died at the home of his brother George, N. Mr. Shoppe had suffered stroke and was confined to bed during most of his illness. Frank Shoppe was born in Barrington on December 3, 1852 and was the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. John Shoppe. He was engaged in farming and was still a young man had the misfortune to lose his left arm in a coal shedder. He later worked as a watchman for 17 years.

He is survived by his brother George of Chicago, two sisters Mrs. Mathilda Hatje, 124 North avenue, Barrington, and Mrs. Corolla Curry; a brother, W. W. Meno, Ark., three nieces, seven nephews, three grand-nephews and one grand-niece. Former Resident Dies. Barrington friends recently news this week of the death of Mrs. W. F.
