

Architectural Work of O. Cerny Topic of Building Story

An article dealing with the architectural and personal background of Oskar Cerny, architect, 123 George street, is published this week in the Economist, daily and trade publication. The article deals with the interest Mr. Cerny has taken in American architectural design for homes.

Mr. Cerny maintains an office in Chicago but has made many plans for new projects in this community. The article reveals, he concludes the American colonial well suited to the requirements of the locality not only because it is typically American but because country sites offer advantageous settings for that sort of dwelling.

The article further relates:

Barrington and its environs are to have far and wide if not better than the majority of villages near Chicago from the point of view of new building and, according to Mr. Cerny, this year is producing \$1,900,000 worth of construction, the majority of which consists of new building. The homes are ranging in price from \$26,000 to \$70,000 and a large number of them are being located on spacious sites.

Mr. Cerny was born June 1, 1888 in Vienna and came to Chicago with his family in 1904. They made their home in Chicago where he attended the Armour Institute from which he graduated with B.S. and M.S. degrees. In 1922 he won the LeRoy scholarship with a design for a readjustment center for soldiers and spent a year studying at the American Academy in Rome and in traveling. His home is at 123 George street in Barrington.
