HOLC Acquires 56 Homes in County

Thirty-six homes have either been taken over by the HOLC or are in the process of foreclosure and at least 20 others have voluntarily conveyed their property to the HOLC while 151 other home owners in Lake county have been making monthly repayments on principal and interest of \$60,000 a month. The loans were all obtained from the Home Owner's Loan Corporation in 1934 and 1935.

Latest available home loan statistics show that 1916 distressed home owners in Lake and McHenry counties were assisted by HOLC loans. Of that number 1651, including 34 in the Cook county section of Barrington were listed in Lake county and 245 in McHenry county.

Of the 1617 home loans in Lake county, 24 per cent have been taken into circuit court by the foreclosure route and 14 per cent have been defaulted and the properties voluntarily turned over to the corporation. A small number of other home owners face possible foreclosure proceedings for failure to make monthly payments.

From January 15 up to Friday 26 foreclosure suits had been started by the HOLC. Most of these suits have gone through the court procedure with master in chancery hearings and masters' sales. The HOLC did all the buying, and in practically every sale the master reported a deficiency.

In making a study of some of the homes put on the auction block in the foreclosure proceedings, one finds two reasons for the deficiencies. First, the court costs and master in chancery fees; and second the appraisal of the home on which the loan was made is

generally higher than the market value.
