WPA Reports First Year's Progress

Completion of one year of full-time operation of the WPA program in district No. 1 in northern Illinois marked the month of November with official records showing a total of \$9,143,250 expended in the 21 counties. This amount of federal funds allotted for projects since the program's inception, plus \$2,222,314 which was contributed by sponsoring bodies, makes a total of \$11,465,564 spent up to November 15.

In addition to the amounts expended both by the WPA and sponsors a considerable amount has been pledged for the completion of the projects now in operation. Sponsors, usually city governments, counties and townships, have paid approximately one-fourth toward the work on their requested projects. Construction of farm-to-market

roads has played a predominant part in the work relief program. Hundreds of miles of highways already having been graded and gravelled. Included in this type of work are miles of city streets that have been improved.

Second in importance have been the public utilities group which includes installation of storm and sanitary sewers, water mains and related improvements.

In Lake county the WPA has spent \$907,685 while sponsors have contributed \$205,532. These figures represent total costs on suspended, completed and operating projects up to November 15.
