

Athletic Policies of N. W. Conference Under New System

Bar Competition; Eliminate Titles and Trophies at Meeting

At the time conference competitors between the schools which members of the Northwest conference has been eliminated. It was the decision reached at the conference meeting held at Barrington High school last Tuesday evening.

Immediate effect means that this year, and there will be trophies awarded at the end of the present season. Next year's football schedule is to be entirely revised under the "new system". A committee, composed of Bright, Antioch; Conger, Minerton Heights; Clark, Barrington; Wilson, Lyndon; Weener, St. Charles; as the responsibility for submitting the new schedule for that sport at the March meeting for approval. They will consider the preference of individual schools and an effort will be made to formulate the schedules to naturalize and nearby schools. "There is some why any school," explained Mr. Drummond, secretary of the conference, "should be asked to travel to distant points for basketball games." The principals and coaches delegated to Mr. Drummond the sole responsibility for making any arrangement for the press of events transpiring at the Wednesday night meeting.

The same principles that will be followed in compiling the new schedule will be followed in making new schedules for football track and for which championships and trophy awards are things of the past. The press will be followed to publish the number of games won and lost by each school. There will be no official championships. The action of the meeting Wednesday evening came somewhat as a surprise to the majority of the coaches, who found that the principals at a meeting a week earlier had evidently decided unanimously upon the action that was officially approved by the larger body this week.

Niles Center was admitted to the conference being the number of schools up to twelve. There were no dissenting votes to the latter action. In explaining the reason for the change in policy, Mr. Drummond says in part: "The present schedule is too heavy; the principle is that one game a week is sufficient; that the tournament between the members, coming at a normal examination period, takes too much time and attention of the players and the school itself. That the method of competition between schools in the Northwest conference will be likened to that followed in the Ben Ten colleges. The principals made it plain that intramural sports in the individual schools will be advanced in importance by the changes in conference athletic policy. A great number of pupils will have the opportunity to take part in sports under the new plan. The individual prowess of players will be lessened, and scholastic attainments will not be so much overshadowed by athletic honors."

Zoo Leaguers Open Season With First Game Series Sat.

Fifty-seven boys, who are not on the regular high school basketball teams, turned out for the annual high school season of zoo league basketball. The first series of games were played off last Saturday in a peppy fashion. Teams are more evenly organ-
